How it Works!

Welcome to Glacier National Park's Historic Headquarters Area Walking Tour. Today we will take a stroll through the administrative area of Glacier National Park, learn a bit about the architecture of fifteen historic structures, and get a glimpse into what it takes to keep a national park operating.

To begin your audio tour, simply dial 406-281-7023 and enter the appropriate audio stop number on your cell phone keypad, followed by the # key. Disconnect the call while walking between stops; you can rejoin as many times as you like by dialing the tour phone number.





Audio Stop 1# The Administration Building, constructed in 1963, serves as the park's main administrative center.





Audio Stop 2# To the Kootenai, Salish, Pend d'Oreille, and Blackfeet people, the Glacier National Park landscape has long been a place of tremendous spiritual importance.



Audio Stop 3# *Employee housing* built during the "Mission 66" era, 1956–1966.



Audio Stop 4# The Commissioner's Residence was built in 1929 to house the park's U.S. Commissioner. Legal jurisdiction of the park lies with the federal government.



Audio Stop 5# The Community Building was originally built at Apgar, as part of the Gold Brothers hotel complex, in 1923. It was moved to the headquarters area in 1938.





Audio Stop 6# These employee dormitories (above) and Mess Hall (below) were built in the late 1920s and early 1930s. Two of these structures are now used to store the park's archives.


Audio Stop 10# The Fire Management Office

Stop 15# Construction of the Civilian Conservation Corps Garages began in the early 1940s. They were originally


built to store the heavy equipment used to maintain the Going-to-the-Sun Road.
